## Big Thanks to our contributors!

The new groomer has arrived! As reported in the previous newsletter, the purchase of a new groomer is a rare event. It was made possible by far-sighted club members and years of saving. With a price tag of \$101,121, it is quite an achievement for the club to have come up with 68% of that sum.

The remainder was provided by funding agencies that were impressed with the club's commitment of money and its annual 3,000 hours of volunteer effort. The *Revelstoke Credit Union*, the *Columbia Basin Trust*, *BC Hydro*, and the *BC Gaming Commission* contributed a total of \$32,500 towards the purchase of the groomer, and an additional \$10,000 towards its operation.

These contributed funds enabled us to purchase a much newer machine than we could otherwise afford. This matters a great deal in terms of the time and money that will be needed for maintenance in the future. We are doubly fortunate that our volunteer grooming crew can also perform many of the routine maintenance requirements. These guys put in about 2,000 volunteer hours as it is, so a newer groomer does a lot to help prevent volunteer burn-out.

The remainder of our volunteer time comes from a range of activities: the Lantern Ski, the Jackrabbit Ski League, hut duty, the fun race and cook out, cabin and sign maintenance, directors meetings, year-end supper and awards, newsletters, and so on. Please consider participating in one of these roles at some point in your time as a ski club member.

# Youth program named for ski pioneer

Herman Smith-Johannsen, better known as Jackrabbit Johannsen, was born in Norway in 1875. After graduating as an engineer, he immigrated to the US in 1900 and went to work selling mining equipment in remote places around the world.

One such location was in northern Quebec where the native Cree nicknamed him "wapoos" (their word for snowshoe hare) for his speed on snow. They had not seen skis before his arrival. Nor had most North Americans. Somehow the name wapoos morphed to Jackrabbit.

After the economic collapse of 1929 forced Johannsen out of business, he devoted himself fulltime to the promotion and development of skiing. He oversaw the construction of many trails in Quebec and upstate New York, and even installed North America's first rope tow near Shawbridge, Quebec. He intended it as a learning device to enable skiers to master downhill technique more quickly. He also built jumps and organized races.

However, he is best known for his unflagging promotion of cross country skiing through the 1950s and 1960s, a time when trail skiing had all but disappeared as a winter pastime in North America.

The revival of cross country skiing in North America prompted a flurry of trail development. While I was working on one such project in 1972, Jackrabbit came out to see how we were doing on a trail he had built in the 1930s. He arrived at our camp before we had finished breakfast. His son-in-law supported him by the elbow (he was 97 years old after all) as he spent an hour walking our crude trail.

Jackrabbit continued to ski well past his 100th birthday. He passed away in 1987 and is commemorated in the Jackrabbit Ski League, a nation wide program that fosters trail skiing among children.


