

## 2015/2016 President's Report

The winter of 2015/2016 has now come to an end with this recent spell of warm weather. Most outdoor enthusiast's thoughts have now moved to their summer activities; however we still need to discuss our progress over the winter.

I was very appreciative of being selected as President of the Revelstoke Nordic Ski Club last year at the AGM. Dave Kaegi was very convincing regarding the role of president. I agree that this club is very well structured and managed due to a great group of dedicated board members and a supportive club membership. Each of the board members has contributed in a way that has maximized access to grants, coordinated training, increased membership, maintained the buildings and equipment, balanced the books and ensured the spectacularly well groomed trails. The club puts out regular communications, is accountable for all of its income and spends its funds wisely. We are financially comfortable due to these efforts. We have also been effective in attracting day use and rentals. This has been a very good year for the club.

The club has progressed in many ways this year. This is the first year with an Operations Manager position--Duane has provided effective building and equipment maintenance, and spent time selling passes and renting equipment. Kelsey was the face of the Revelstoke Nordic Ski club in the role of Club Manager, where she sold day passes, rented equipment, spoke with the public, instructed lessons, kept the lodge tidy and wrote and presented on grants access funds to improve our facility. The club outright acquired the entire stock of rental equipment, following the conclusion of a deal with the School District. Brush clearing resulted in safer trails and improved clearance for grooming. The groomer was heavily maintained over the year with a major repair to the tiller and some annual preventative maintenance. It is expected that through a successful grant application that the current groomer will be replaced with a newer more efficient model for the upcoming season.

The Okanagan Cup Race was held in early January with a wonderful mix of volunteers making it possible. The various development teams were evident all over the facility and trails as they trained for the various races held in other communities over the winter. Under Matt's coaching, there have been some great successes on the part of these youth. . Matt has agreed to join the club year round and will be running a summer program for the race team members. We look forward to continued success for our athletes under his excellent coaching. The Jackrabbits' and Bunnies' programs have seen increases with great participation and coaching contribution each week.

The Dog Loop saw regular if not increased activity, with many happy skiers and dogs able to access these wonderful trails. The snowshoe trails were in excellent condition and resulted in what appeared to be a healthy mix of winter sports. Talk exists of purchasing snowshoes for the following season to increase participation in this exciting way to access the terrain.

Steps have been taken to make the lodge safer, with new rubber runners outside to reduce the slippery ice effect, and the stairs have been covered with recycled tires to reduce trips and falls.

A survey has gone out to get input from club members on the possible expansion of the Dog Loop Trails. At this point the Board will be discussing the outcome and making a decision on as to action to be taken.

Details of this year's accomplishments and volunteer contributions are presented in the reports contributed by directors and staff. Thank you to volunteers and directors for all your efforts and to staff for a job well done.

It is at this point however that I need to tender my resignation as Club President. Although I was not able to commit as much time as the club needed, I was comforted by the fact that the club was running so efficiently, that it functioned with very little input from me. I have not provided the club the dedication it deserves, primarily because of the unrelenting demands of my employment. Therefore I regretfully submit my resignation from the board at the AGM.

I will continue to be a part of the RNSC when possible, and hopefully will find more time to use the trials next year. I thank you for allowing me to be such a part of the club and look forward to assisting on a more informal basis.

# 2015/2016 Treasurer's Report

The net cash position of the club improved by just over \$5,000 in the current fiscal year to \$119,839. We have ear marked just over \$70,000 of that cash balance towards the purchase of a new groomer. That purchase is contingent on receipt of two large grant requests for \$300,000.

## **Club Operations**

Club Revenue exceeded budget by \$16,900. Excluding Lodge Donations and Grants, revenue was up by 1% over the previous year. Expenses exceeded budget by \$29,400. The major contributors to this overage were accounting costs of \$11,600 (explained in detail below), groomer equipment maintenance of \$7,600, and wages of \$10,600 with the hiring of an Operations Manager this year. Including the GST claim noted below, net cash available for Club Operations is \$52,000 at year end.

## Ski League

Ski League Revenue exceeded budget this year by \$9,700. Hard work by many volunteers resulted in fundraising revenue more than \$4,000 over budget. Overall, revenue was on par with 2014/2015. Expenses were \$7,600 over budget primarily due to Athlete Support costs for Nationals. Including surpluses from prior years, net cash available to Ski League at year-end is \$31,400.

## **Capital Projects**

Grants of \$9,800 and a club contribution of \$6,500 allowed us to complete the lighting project, widen the Main Loop trail below the cabin, and install rubber flooring in the lodge basement and on the lodge stairs. In addition to the \$70,000 put aside for the new groomer, there will be \$14,300 available for capital projects in the coming year.

## **Regulatory Filings**

The club worked with BDO Chartered Accountants this year to file all regulatory filings that had been required for the past 5 years, including GST, Non-Profit Organization, Income Tax and Logging Tax returns. Revenue Canada accepted our voluntary late filing and we will not be assessed any late filing fees or penalties. As a non-profit organization, we do not have any Income Tax payable, but still have to file annual returns. The filing of our GST returns has us expecting as much as \$46,500 in refunds of Input Tax Credits (net of GST collected). There is a chance that our claim for 2011 will be denied due to the passage of time (over 4 years ago) which would reduce our expected claim to \$10,500. A large part of the claim related to ITC's on the build of the lodge in 2011. The cost for preparing, reviewing and filing these returns was \$11,500. Thanks to Jamie Kraus (our club accountant) for her assistance with these filings.

## 2016/17 Budget

The club is forecasting a surplus of \$26,200 for the coming year. This surplus includes the assumption that we will be successful in our new groomer grant applications. If we do not receive sufficient funds, a large part of this surplus will be used to keep our existing groomer running. Ski League will be seeking a Gaming Grant of \$19,000 (\$14,000 last year) to ensure a balanced budget. Our Coach, Matt Smider, has agreed to join the club year round and will be running a summer program for the race team members.

We will be receiving Grants from the Revelstoke Credit Union and CBT in the amount of \$5,100. Together with a club contribution of \$10,300, we will be using these funds to add pole protection pads and B-netting for races, an HRV system to control moisture in the shop, and staining the exterior of the lodge and shop. Look for a few volunteer opportunities this summer to complete the staining projects.

## 2015/2016 Manager's Report

Hello from the office! This was the second season the RNSC hired a Club Manager. It was a pleasure to work with the Club.

#### Schedule:

This position was 35 hours per week, Thursday through Monday. Tuesday and Wednesday was covered by the Operations Manager. If either the Club Manager or Operations Manager needed time off, we arranged it between us to cover the office, using volunteers only a few times this season.

#### Office duties:

I began the position November 2. I got a quick run-down from Natelle, and jumped right in. I am very grateful for her thorough documentation and logical organization of her duties and tasks and documents. I spent November meeting with board members to understand how the Club is run, cleaning up the office and the lodge, updating the website and calendar, distributing brochures, scraping wax off rental skis, and more. Ticket sales and rentals really took off mid-December, and remained busy until late February. Sales were highest over the Christmas holidays.

Regular office duties include:

- Opening the lodge, making sure the deck is shoveled and the parking lot is ploughed
- Updating the grooming reports on the website, Facebook, snow-phone, and conditions board
- Ticket and rental sales, selling and printing memberships
- Administrative duties (tracking revenues, email correspondence, visitor inquiries)
- Custodial duties
- Purchasing needed supplies (office supplies, cleaning supplies, tickets, tea and coffee)
- Coordinating groomer schedule
- Bank deposits
- Updating the website and bulletin boards for events and information about the Club
- Attending board meetings

#### Funding:

January and February were spent applying for funding. I applied for the following grants:

We did not receive support for the Via Sport grant for ski league skis. We received \$4,000 from CBT Community Initiatives, and \$1,100 from the RCU Community Giving Grant for race hosting equipment. I have not heard if we received any other support.

Other grants that were talked about but no applications were submitted are the Southern Interior Development Initiatives Trust (this grant "support[s] regionally strategic investments in economic development projects that will have long-lasting and measurable regional benefits for the Southern Interior.") and the Tourism Infrastructure Grant from Columbia Basin Trust. We can still apply for both grants—the SIDIT has no deadline, and the CBT grant has another intake in July. Good project candidates for these or future grants are maintenance on the Ole Sandberg Hut (SIDIT), the expansion of the parking lot (CBT), and lights for Little Dippet (CBT).

#### Ticket office financials:

We started using a computer-based point-of-sales revenue tracking system this year. It has been useful in tracking sales of trail passes, rentals and lessons. I also tried to use it to track how much money we receive in the fee vault, and where day-users are from. Tracking where visitors are from was moderately successful (just that when it's busy you don't always get around to asking whether they live in Revelstoke or not). I managed to record that *at least* 10% of day-users are not living in Revelstoke, and as I got better at recording, the figure got up to 46%. So my educated guess is that it is close to 40%. We collected over \$1,930 from the fee vault (plus whatever Duane may have collected).

Later in the season, I had the opportunity to get out on the snow to instruct private lessons and the high-school physical education classes. Instructing is a nice compliment to office duties.

## **Rentals:**

This was the second year of having rentals available at the Revelstoke Nordic Lodge. This season, we had \$2,000 to purchase more kid-sized boots and skis, and also five pairs of skate skiing boots to fill out our size range. When school groups visit, and during the Christmas break (especially the lantern ski), nearly all the rentals are used. Other than that, we have a good

array of sizes available. We will continue to budget for replacing rental equipment, and the next board will decide about keeping with SNS or switching to the increasingly popular NNN binding system.

  - Our Jackrabbit program included 14 Saturday sessions & 10 Tuesday sessions.
  - Jackrabbits 2-4 were offered a one-hour skate ski focused session Tuesday afternoons.
  - We reduced the Jackrabbits 1 lesson from 2 hours to 1.5 hours.
  - Our Bunnies program was 10 one-hour sessions.
- Team Scream was a "Tropical" treat under the leadership of Eleanor Wilson. Sunshine and great organization made for a fun event. Thanks to Terra for the delicious food!
- Amazing fundraising efforts.
  - We were awarded a \$14,000 BC Gaming Grant in August 2015.
  - Coopers Card Fundraiser has grown again thanks to the efforts of Natalie MacLeod and Vanessa Morrow.

- Our Bottle Drive team put in a big effort, Koreen sorted Parks bottles
- Lucie organized a 50/50 draw.
- Penny & Richard hosted a concession again this year for the Dirty Feet Trail Race.
- The Ski Nationals Committee raised funds through Cinnamon Bun & McBunny sales in addition to a Raffle.
- Our race team had many accomplishments with numerous skiers achieving personal bests. Our club was well represented right through to the Nationals. Our team placed 3<sup>rd</sup> at BC Championships in Whistler! (More details in Coach's Report).
- OK Cup # 1, hosted by our Club on January 2<sup>nd</sup> was a grand success thanks to the volunteer commitment of our Club. Revelstoke was well represented with many of our young athletes competing for their first time! We hosted 249 competitors for the 1-day race. ## 2015/2016 Coach's Report

2015-16 was another successful season for the Revelstoke Nordic Ski Club! Included in this report is a summary of our coach-led programs and events: Ski S'kool and RSS, Adult and Private Lessons and Clinics, the Race Team and the Headlamp Heroes Race Series.

#### Ski S'kool

Our Ski S'kool program successful played host to all grade four students from Arrow Heights, Columbia Park, Begbie View and Ecole des Glaciers. Each class made four visits to Macpherson; enjoying instruction on the Nordic fundamentals, playing a multitude of games and skiing the Dog Loop, Mickey's and Main Loop. Thanks to the teachers and parent-helpers for their support during the visits. Additionally, thanks to Janette Vickers and Louisa Fleming for volunteering their time to assist Coach Matt in leading the sessions.

#### **Revelstoke Secondary School**

Revelstoke Nordic and Revelstoke Secondary School combined efforts to run a successful Nordic program expanded to include all physical education students. All ages of PE classes attended two or three times each, for a total of 21 class visits. Daniel Blackie, Ian Ward and Kelsey Knoll assisted Coach Matt in leading the sessions.

#### Adult Lessons, Private Lessons and Clinics and Open Training

A record 101 skiers took part in our adult programming during the 2015-16 season. 19 skiers completed our Adult Beginner classes offered in both skate and classic. 12 skiers completed the Adult Intermediate/Advanced courses, in addition to the many coaches who regularly joined these technique-based sessions. 20 skiers attended the One Day Clinics and 50 individuals took part in private lessons. Kelsey Knoll and Kellen Viznaugh assisted Coach Matt to address the increased demand for private lessons. Open Training sessions ran on non-Headlamp Hero Wednesday nights with a steadily growing group of keen skiers engaging in these intensity-oriented sessions.

#### **Headlamp Heroes**

136 skiers participated over the course of the four-race series. Events included: a classic interval start, free sprints, free mass start and a mixed technique relay. Thank you to all volunteers who assisted at the events, in particular, Wade Viznaugh for his efforts to ensure race-day grooming. Additionally, thank you to our local sponsors for donation prizes for all competitors: Skookum Cycle and Ski, The Village Idiot, Mica Heliskiing, The Modern Bakeshop and Cafe and Flowt Bikes and Skis.

#### **Coaching Development**

Revelstoke Nordic hosted three coaching courses during the 2015-16 season. Six local coaches completed their Introductory Community Coaching (ICC); four completed the Community Coaching (CC); and three completed the Learning to Train (L2T). Thank you to Investors Group

for a generous coaching development grant that assists the club in covering coaching course costs.

#### Race Team

The Revelstoke Nordic Race Team has enjoyed a long, successful season of training and racing. As a team, we raced to 4<sup>th</sup> place at the BC Midget Championships in January, and in March scored 3<sup>rd</sup> place at the BC Championships and placed 15<sup>th</sup> overall and 10<sup>th</sup> out of junior teams at the Ski Nationals. Recently, nine out of 16 eligible Revelstoke athletes were named to the 2016-17 provincial teams:

**BC Talent Squad** - Emily Macleod, Jaclyn Elliott, Kolibri Drobish, Nelson Luxmore **BC Development Squad** - Elizabeth Elliott, Erik Brosch, Simon Blackie **BC Ski Team** - Alana Brittin, Beth Granstrom

Our program ran through the summer, with Matti Little and Coach Matt directing our twiceweekly summer program offerings, assisted by Robyn Thomas, Bruce Granstrom and Mandy Kellner. Revelstoke athletes on the BC Development Squad were fortunate to participate in a summer training opportunity on the Haig Glacier. Our fall sessions began in September, with three-weekly sessions for the Track Attack and four-weekly sessions for the Junior Development. Coach Matt led these workouts, continually supported by a strong cast of coaches including Robyn, Bruce, Mandy and Kellen Viznaugh. Athletes on the Development Squad participated in two fall camps in Whistler and Revelstoke and an early on-snow camp in Vernon. Similarly, our BC Talent Squad skiers attended a fall camp in 100 Mile House and an early on-snow camp in Vernon. Once winter rolled around, Kip Drobish was added to a superb coaching support team as athletes continued with three or four weekly sessions on-snow. This year we had 15 volunteers groom the trail network. Approximately 400 hours were spent grooming—3 hours per session, on average. Big thanks to Al McInnes, Dave Kaegi, Duane Dukart, Harry Van Oort, Kevin Bollefer, Mark Davis, Mark Gunner, Mat Wallace, Pat McMechan, Rob Evans, Rob Jay, Tom Patry, Trent Kappler, and Wade Viznaugh. In addition to grooming, Rob Jay, Al McInnes and a few others spent numerous hours repairing and servicing the machines. Thanks guys!

# 2015/2016 Operations and Facilities Report

#### Grooming Report

- Grooming took place from November 17 to April 2.
- Total days of grooming: 154 days, minus 11 down, equals 143 days for the big groomer.
- Total number of hours this season on big groomer: 390 hours. Last season was 380 hours.
- The snowmobile and quad were used minimally, mostly used to for pre-grooming prep in November and during groomer breakdowns.
- Excellent groomed conditions nearly every day.
- Three major breakdowns (11 days total) during the season required substantial effort and money to repair and minimize downtime.

### **Groomer Repairs**

- Pre-season work: new radiator, suspension parts, new front engine seal. Done by Dec Prinoth
- Dec. 2015: Rad fan clutch replaced. \$1000
- Jan. 2016: Tiller drive gearbox failed to the point of being unrepairable. A used unit for \$1500 was sourced instead of a new unit for \$5500. The tiller drive motor seal, drive sprocket, and tiller universal joints were replaced at the same time. An additional \$1000 in parts.
- Feb. 2016: Front engine seal failed again replaced on warranty (Prinoth).
- Feb.2016: Frame mount for tiller broke on left hand side, also bent some tiller components. New, heavier one made and welded on; tiller components straightened.
- Many minor repairs and adjustments throughout the season.

#### **Quad Repairs**

- Early season repairs include warranty repairs on exhaust system, heat shielding, and brake system.
- After ~35 hours of use, the front differential failed. Also some more brake issues.
- Quad is still in the shop for additional warranty repairs.

#### **Snowmobile Repairs**

- Snowmobile received pre-season tune-up and adjustments to track and steering.
   Exhaust system was loose and causing excessive noise and oiling up of cylinders. Drive belt was worn to unserviceable and replaced.
- Snowmobile performed without issues for the season with a small amount of use.

## **Trails and Trail Lights**

- Trails were in good shape for the start of the season and carried through to the end nicely with a little snow road building through the problem spots on Easy Al's and Mickey's.

- Some summer grooming of trails is needed to prevent groomer from hitting rocks, stumps, and dirt piles during early and late season grooming.
- Six trail lights were repaired through the season. Three of them only required cleaning moisture from and tightening of the dummy light sensor. It would be a worth-while summer project to tighten and seal this device on all the lights. The other three required new ballasts, which were covered on warranty.

## Lodge Repairs and Upgrades

- Downstairs concrete floor was covered with a non-slip, soft durable rubber made from recycled tires. A grant was received to cover this expense, but the Club paid to have the bathrooms done at the same time for minimal cost. Duane removed the bathroom stalls and fixtures, the base boards, doors and shelves to get a complete and tidy installation. The baseboards were replaced with institutional quality vinyl baseboards that meet health requirements for cleaning. They are sealed to the new flooring to prevent moisture seepage under the walls. The shelving unit was lifted off the floor and a basekick added to ensure proper cleaning of the floor.
- After a slip on the indoor stairwell, the club decided to replace the stair treads with nonslip, durable rubber treads, also made from recycled tires. The stairwell landing was included to make the entire stairwell non-slip.
- Duane did a substantial amount work on the basement floor and stairwell during ticket office shifts.

#### Hours of Work Breakdown

- The Operations Manager worked from November 2 to March 30.
- Normal hours of work were three eight-hour days per week. Additional hours were worked for special occasions and major groomer repairs.
- Ticket Office regular hours: 268
- Extra hours in ticket office covering the Office Managers requested extra time off: 66
- Major groomer repairs: 86 (48 of these were above regular shifts)
- Regular workshop maintenance and repairs of equipment, trails, facilities: 164
- Additional hours on basement and stairwell projects: 16
- Total Hours for the season: 600
- Additional volunteered hours (grooming, quick repairs and lubrications on non-work days, organization, communications): 36

## 2015/2016 Dog Loop Report

The Revelstoke Nordic Ski Club continues to provide members with an opportunity to ski with a dog off-leash on groomed cross-country skiing trails. This season, 222 members registered to ski with their dog(s). Members are required to submit their dog's name and description, and sign an agreement to the dog loop policies. Currently, day pass users do not read and sign the dog loop policy. In the future, day-users skiing with their dog(s) on the dog loop, they will be required to read and sign the dog loop policies agreement.

One conflict was reported between a skier and a dog on the dog loop. Not enough information was known to identify the dog owner who did not follow the dog loop policies.

Nine members made financial donations to the Club for maintaining the dog loop.

All members skiing with their dog were advised to be vigilant about removing dog poop from the groomed trail. Many members show good stewardship of the loop by picking up any poop on the track.

This season, 10 more orange trowels were added to the loop. Roadway Ramble has twice as many trowels and posts as last season.

This will be my last year on the RNSC Board and the Dog Loop director. Lucie Bergeron has agreed to replace me on the board. Lucie has been involved with the dog loop since its inception and she will be a diligent, fair representative of members who enjoy skiing with their dogs. Kathy Bellis and Nadine Smith have also volunteered their time to ensure this wonderful loop remains respectful to all Club members and trail users.

It goes through open cut-blocks and dense woods. The loop is dog-friendly, and the Club asks that snowshoers tread lightly on the groomed ski trails. Details about the trail are available at the parking lot kiosk, from the website, and at the ticket office. Trail use is free to RNSC members and non-members are required to pay a parking fee of \$5.25 per vehicle. More people used this trail than last season.

November 15, 2015 Revelstoke Nordic Ski Club participated in the RBC Sport Day in Canada by hosting a snowshoe tour on the Seven Bridges Trail. Unfortunately, that day was a predictably rainy Revelstoke day without snow. Although no snowshoes were required, six hardy people hiked the loop.

Future plans are to make a shorter, easier loop that begins and ends at the lodge and to aquire rental snowshoes. An application was submitted January 31 to the City of Revelstoke for a "Grant-in-Aid" for 13 pairs of snowshoes.

This will be my last year with the RNSC board. It has been an eye-opener to see all the efforts that go on behind the scenes to operate this Club. Consider volunteering. The Seven Bridges snowshoe trail is a wonderful loop and is sure to bring visitors and locals to appreciate this trail.

  - e. Sarah Newton suggested getting a grant to have a bus come up from town for an after school program.
- 8. Coach's Report- Matt Smider, read by Heidi Hopkins
  - a. Report attached.
- 9. Facilities Report- Rob
  - a. Report attached.
  - b. There is some work to be done on the Lodge over the summer: repainting the doors, a work party for the spindles, a grate to be installed.
  - c. Sally Thompson suggested that the Ole Sandberg Cabin needs minor repairs and that the Club should contact Marci Bennett regarding this.
- 10. Communications Report- Brendan
  - a. Report attached.
  - b. Fat bikes, and whether or not to allow them on trails was discussed. It was noted that the bikes are becoming increasingly popular. Brendan did some tests with them this year: When temps are below -2C bikes don't make a lot of impact. The two major concerns are skier/biker interactions (the bikes travel downhill faster than skiers) and the soft section in the middle of our trails left by our groomer. When the bikes go into this section they leave a large mark. Alternatives such as grooming some of the secondary trails with the ginzu or just laying down a track with the snowmobile were discussed. It was decided that the new Executive will need to develop an official policy on fat bikes in the coming year.
- 11. Trails and Grooming Report- Jeff, read by Rob
  - a. Report attached.
  - b. Brushing work for the summer was discussed. Heidi Hopkins mentioned that forestry crews were looking for early season work.

- c. Rob talked about the decision not to hire a paid groomer. Volunteers enjoyed grooming and did a great job this year. Jeff and Rob had an end of season groomers meeting and most of the groomers were keen to come back. Jeff to give more training to volunteers at the beginning of the year, to decrease wear and tear on the machine.
- d. Harry Van Oort suggested a second One Way sign on Main Loop as skiers often go the wrong way.
- 12. Dog Trails and Users Report- Paula
  - a. Report attached.
  - b. Sally Thompson asked if there will be snowshoe rentals next year- it is something that the Club will look into.

Duane Dukart asked what the status was on logging plans at MacPherson and logging was discussed by members and the board. Brendan has been receiving emails from concerned members. Over the past year board members have met with BCTS and other stakeholders on a number of occasions. The Club has expressed in a letter to BCTS that it would prefer that no logging take place at MacPherson but that it is particularly concerned about the cut-block near the lodge. Norm Tennant asked what the official Club policy was. Dave said that the Club currently doesn't have an official policy as we represent a wide X section of interests. Putting a vote to the membership was suggested. Michael Morris suggested approaching the minister. It was decided that the new executive will need to make a decision on how to address this and on what the Club's official position will be.

- 13. Election of Directors- Dave
  - a. Dave calls for nominations to the board three times
  - b. The following members were nominated: Mark Gunner, Koreen Morrone, Lori Milmine and Kurt Grabinsky. Proposed by Dave. Seconded by Robyn.
  - c. Mark, Koreen, Lori and Kurt were elected unanimously. Mark will act as treasurer, Lori as secretary, Koreen as membership and Kurt as president.
- 14. New Business- Robyn
  - a. Special Resolution. A motion was made by Mike Thomas to amend bylaw article 38 to state that the RNSC's fiscal year ends on March 31<sup>st</sup>. Dave seconds. All members in favour of the amendment. Natelle to amend the bylaws document.

There being no other business the Chair closed the meeting at 9:30 pm.
