Dogs on the Trail

Welcome to another great season of skiing with your dog! The Revelstoke Nordic Ski Club (RNSC) has one of the best dog loops going, and it is unique in a number of ways. A quick survey of other clubs across the province reveals that clubs that offer trails that welcome dogs are quite rare. Further, when trails are available, they are often segregated from the main trail system, very short, and rarely groomed. Our dog loop is groomed regularly, is a respectable length, is accessible from the parking lot, and includes connector trails that make it fun to loop around and around. All this to say, love your loop! Review the club's dog policy on our website, respect other skiers, and please, please, please clean up after you pet. Take it a step further and toss any waste that you run across while skiing.

To ensure the continued success of the dog loop going forward, there are few minor issues that can easily be addressed through the cooperation of members who use the dog loop:

Numbers:

The RNSC Dog Policy sets a limit of two dogs per person on our trails. Large groups of uncontrolled dogs are a hazard anywhere, but they are a major concern on ski trails.

The Parking Lot:

Please keep your dog on a leash in the parking lot. This protects your dog, and as the parking lot is often busy and slippery, it is a courtesy to others. Dog should be on a leash in the stadium area as well. Finally, dogs should not be tied to, or brought into the lodge.

There is a hitching post at the beginning of Roadway Ramble that can be used to secure your dog while you are getting organized.

Roadway Ramble:

As you move your dog from the parking lot to the dog loop proper, you will be skiing along a trail where you are most likely to run into very young, novice, and elderly skiers. Please keep your dog on leash for the first 200 meters of the trail.



Saturday is for Bunnies

On Saturdays, please consider waiting until after 11:45 am to take your dog for a ski. Our very youngest skiers, the Bunnies, are often on Roadway Ramble on Saturday mornings, and so the on-leash area extends to the woods on Roadway Ramble at this time. Any good-sized dog easily looks these little guys in the eye, and an uncontrolled dog can be terrifying for them.

Intersections and Downhills

Please ensure that your dog enters intersections in a safe manner. Train your dog to move out of the way of oncoming skiers, particularly on downhills.

Brown Klister (Poo)

Known as brown klister in some circles, nobody wants dog poo on their skis or churned up in a freshly groomed track. Please pick up any messes along the trail.

There are trowels at regular intervals along the trails for this purpose. If you dislike skiing back to get a trowel, using your ski pole or a branch is also an option. If the possible repercussions of mismanaging this fill you with dread, it is also possible to use a dog waste bag as a glove and throw the waste off the trail. Whatever

method you use, make sure that the waste is well off the trail. If none of these options appeal to you and you really prefer to bag your waste, please be careful not to drop it, and make sure to dispose of it at home.

Finally, keeping your dog close-by ensures that you are aware of the need to clean up.

Looking Ahead

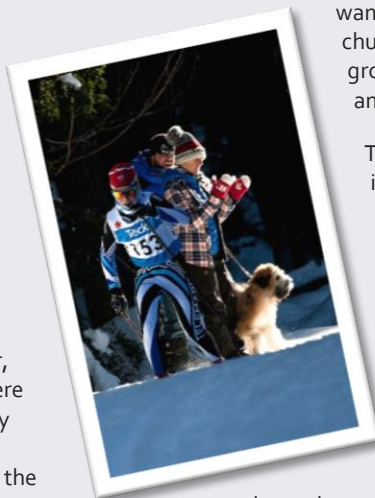

The Future of the RNSC

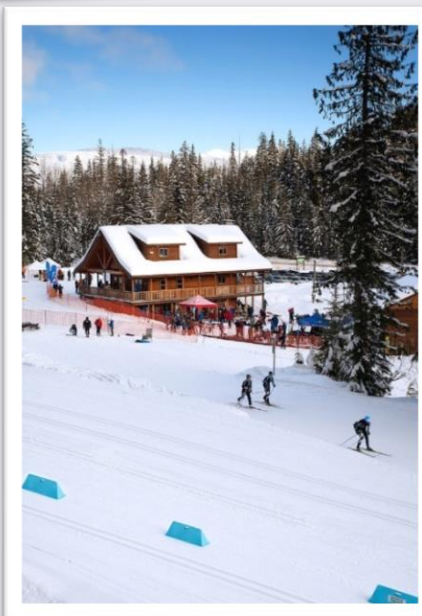

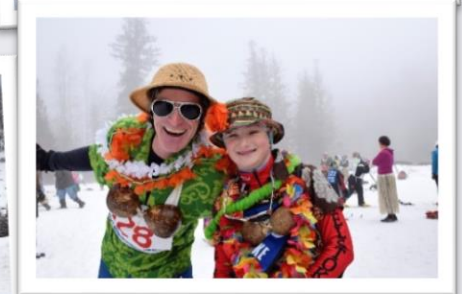
The RNSC executive wants to continue to provide a top-notch experience at our club, and we are planning ahead to ensure that we get things right. However, we can't do this without your input.

Off-Season Training

Without a doubt, the Revelstoke Nordic skiers were spotted training throughout the off-season! You may have seen us roller-skiing on Meadows in the Sky or adventuring on Joss Peak. Perhaps we were sloggin' up Kill the Banker or settling into an easy distance ski down Airport Way. Maybe you caught us working the suspension trainers at the Nordic lodge or paddling down to Blanket Creek. Whether on skis, in runners, on bikes or in the water, our skiers have been working hard beginning in May for the Junior Development crew (ages 13+), with our younger Track Attack skiers kicking off their season in September. Since mid-November, we have transitioned (with a few unfortunate disruptions) to on-snow sessions. Our TA crew is on skis three days weekly, while the JD has four weekly team sessions.

A Great Team of Coaches

Our team is led by Coach Matt and supported by a superb network of volunteer coaches: Robyn Thomas, Bruce Granstrom, Rory Luxmoore, Kip Drobish, Megan Evans, Ann-Marie Gill, Mandy Kellner, Matti Little and Tanya Wolgram. We want to extend our thanks to this great team for their time, expertise, and dedication to our athletes and our program.

Camps: On and Off the Snow

As always, our dryland season was highlighted by the vast array of training camp opportunities. As a club, we hosted a local six-day camp in July; in addition to a 100-person regional camp at Blanket Creek in September and another 60-person on-snow regional camp at Silver Star in November. 17 Revelstoke athletes have benefited from the monthly provincial team camps based throughout the province and the Haig Glacier; three of which are co-lead by Coach Matt. One BC Ski Team member, Beth Granstrom, had the great fortune of attending a two-week camp in Sweden this past August.

Race Season is Here

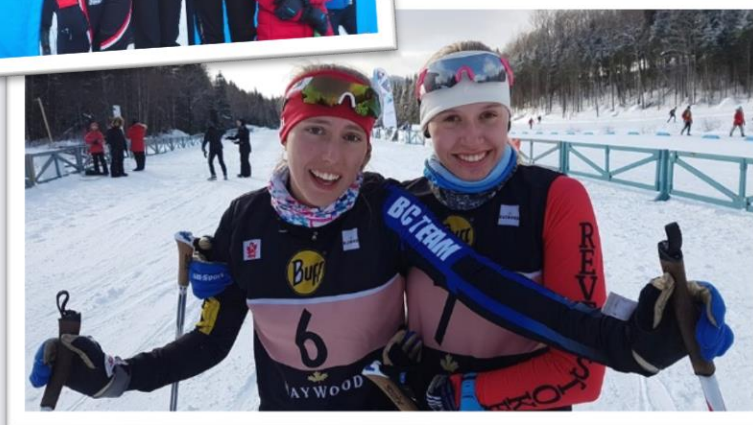
We're now begun another exciting race season. To date, we've had a pre-season event in October

on Canmore's Frozen Thunder, followed by two back-to-back early season NorAm races in Vernon and Rossland. Our team posted excellent results at the Okanagan Cup and BC Winter Games Trials in Salmon Arm on December 30th; the BC Cup in Whistler on January 6th and 7th; and our World Junior Trials in Mont Saint-Anne from January 6th – 10th. Not only has the 2018 season started off with a bang, a new generation of wax technicians has been trained up and they are excited to make use of our brand spankin' new fleet of testing skis.

Parents and Fundraising

Our program would not be possible without the efforts of our parental support network. In particular, parents are integral to our fundraising efforts. In June, we held our firewood sales fundraiser raising \$5800 for the Ski League. A big thank you to Bob Walker for his wood donation and to our local wildfire crews to their efforts bucking and splitting the wood. In September, our bottle drive achieved new record success collecting almost \$2800. Finally, our sale of Save-On cards is an important ongoing fundraiser for our programs. Additionally, we were the proud recipients of two major grants: \$16,000 from the Community Gaming Grant and \$7500 from the National Winter Sports Association.

The BC Midget Championships

Revelstoke Nordic is hosting the BC Midgets Championships this winter. It's a two-day competition for 8-12 year old athletes from across the province, running March 3rd and 4th, 2018. As you may know, Revelstoke's an amazing venue for races, and this is often the first racing experience for the younger athletes.

With three races over the two days, Saturday morning starts with an interval start 2.5km classic race. In the afternoon, athletes compete in a team relay, 2 x 2.5km classic, then 2 x 2.5km skate, lots of teams dress up for this race, it can be very competitive! The athletes have a banquet on Saturday night, but can't stay up too late, because they have an early start with skate sprints on Sunday morning. I hope they'll have had their Weetabix, because Sunday's races are 100% action, with all the excitement happening right in the stadium area on the sprint loop.

A skier looking for an extra challenge can choose the Skiathlon option and complete both laps solo.

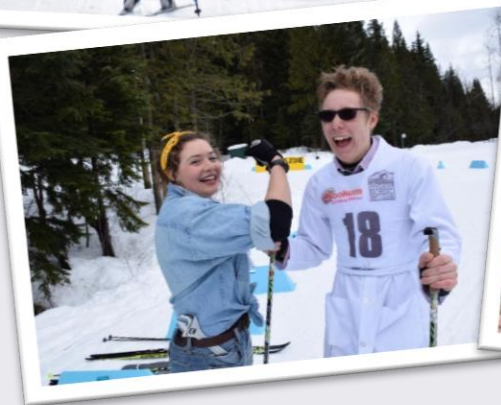
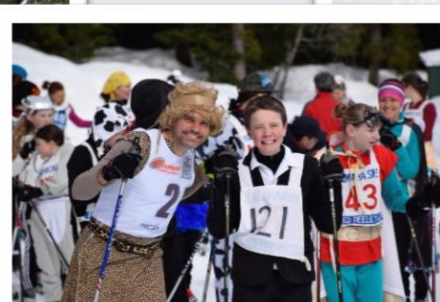
There is also a short lap race for the youngest skiers (Bunnies) at 10:15am.
